### We Celebrate Our Nurses!

The World Health Organization (WHO) and American Nurses Association (ANA) have extended the *Year of the Nurse* and theme: *Excel – Lead – Innovate* into 2021, and have decreed National Nurses Week will continue throughout the month of May in recognition of the work of nurses. One of the tag lines I have been especially drawn to, that I believe so defines who we are, is *Nurses...Leading with courage and compassion!* 

Jean Watson, a nursing theorist who developed the Theory of Human Caring/Caring Science in the mid to late 1970s, proposed that compassion is often a trait required of nurses, embraces the whole-person, addresses how nurses care for their patients and how that caring translates into better health/healing. I was blessed to hear her speak at a Health Ministry Association (HMA) conference several years ago. I feel she captures the essence of Faith Community Nursing when she defines the fruit of caring as a by-product of the values of trust, developing relationships, maintaining hope, and recognizing the importance of Spiritual, Physical and Mental support. Watson's work also associates the work of caring with problem solving outside the box to improve the quality of life for those we serve. (Watson, J. (1979) Nursing the Philosophy & Science of Caring. Nursing Administration Quarterly 3(4), 86-87).

Jean wrote this article 42 years ago, and yet how timely it still is today! The COVID-19 pandemic is most assuredly a world crisis, but it is not the first nor likely the last healthcare catastrophe. The symbol of Florence Nightingale's work in the Crimean War was the lamp to light her way as she compassionately cared for those to whom she ministered. All who came before us, on the battlefields of wars, during Spanish Flu and Polio, nurses who had to problem solve outside the box while providing compassionate care to those they served, have led the way. And we too, my cherished nursing colleagues, are privileged to care for the battle weary as we serve with courage and compassion, and problem solve WAY outside the box of our pandemic. You have volunteered your time at COVID-19 testing sites; been runners; educated the community by phone and in person regarding test results, and convalescent plasma therapy for those who have recovered from illness; provided Mental Health First Aid and resiliency classes; mentored high school students on the art of compassionate care; advocated for and vaccinated migrant farm workers at La Esperanza Clinic in Wimauma, and San Jose Mission Clinic in Dover; served at locations to feed the hungry; cared for the homeless and protected the elderly, and still you make time to attend the virtual educational programs we provide to equip and empower your practice of Faith Community Nursing!

You are extraordinary! You go above and beyond and we are privileged to partner with each and every one of you. During this Year of the Nurse may you be blessed in abundance with which you continue to bless those you serve!



## **Famous Nurses in History**

Who are the women that shaped the course of Nursing? How did this patchwork of nursing careers shape the profession we know today? Here is a small sampling of the courageous women who played a major role in the evolution of nursing practice.

**Florence Nightingale** (1820-1920) is considered to be the founder of Modern Nursing. Her hygiene and sanitation practices revolutionized nursing during the Crimean War. Nightingale's contemporary, **Mary Seacole** (1805-1881), who also ministered to the Crimean soldiers on the front line, was a pioneer in hygiene advancement, so much so that Nightingale adopted Seacole's hygiene practices following the Crimean War.

Founder of the American Red Cross, **Clara Barton** (1821-1912) began with serving the soldiers of the Civil War, where she was known as the "Angel of the Battlefield." Following the war, Barton's service expanded to disaster and emergency victims all over the world.

Mary Breckinridge (1881-1965) created the forerunner to home health care named "Rural Health Care" with a concentration on prenatal and birthing services. In 1925 Breckinridge established "Frontier Nursing Servicey," providing nursing care for low-cost fees. Dorothea Dix (1802-1887) was a fierce advocate for mental health patients and mental health issues/conditions, although most of us will remember her for her educational contributions.

**Linda Richards** (1841-1930) was the first to graduate as a nurse in the United States. She is known for reforming patient records/record keeping, and her accomplishments and organizational processes are still acknowledged today. In 1994 she was inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame and the ANA's Hall of Fame is **Mary Eliza Mahoney** (1845-1926). Mahoney is the first professionally trained African American nurse in the US and was a trailblazer for black women as professionals in nursing, doubling the number of African American nurses from 1910-1930.

Virginia Avenel Henderson (1897-1996) is considered the most famous nurse of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. She developed "the Nursing Theory" – Education, practice, implications, execution, and research. Henderson's contributions have shaped and defined the role of nursing, not only in the United States but internationally. Anna Caroline Maxwell (1851-1929) is known as the American Florence Nightingale, and the founder of the Army Nurse Corps, established in 1901. By 1920, due to her perseverance, nurses received military ranking. Ruby Bradley (1907-2002) is the most decorated woman in US Military. While serving in the Army Nurse Corps, she was captured and detained in Manila. While there, she and other nurses continued to serve and care for other prisoners of war and were named "Angels in Fatigues."

All these amazing nurses share a common thread: they all have the heart of a servant. They gave their talents, time, finances, and lives to a profession serving mankind. God working through them to provide care, improve conditions, educate future nurses and patients. Each of you have the hearts of a servant, you give so freely of yourselves to others. You are God's hands, providing comfort and kindness in so many lives. Thank you for what you do! Happy Nurses Week!!!

#### **VIRTUAL SAFE SITTER COURSE**

Faith Community Nursing will offer a **FREE** two-part Safe Sitter class to students in grades 6–8. There will be two virtual classes on Microsoft Teams:

### Part 1: Wednesday, June 16, 10am-1pm | Part 2: Wednesday, June 23rd, 10am-1pm

The two-part class provides basic information such as child development, childcare routines (including diapering practice) and behavior management, as well as how to set fees and greet employers. In addition to CPR, students learn injury prevention and management, choking rescue, indoor and outdoor safety, online safety and personal safety. The course is designed to prepare students to be safe when they are at home alone, watching younger siblings or babysitting.

Participants will receive a free T-shirt, back sack, instruction book, and a mini Annie Manikin (like the one pictured) to learn and demonstrate CPR.
